

A Passion Play

The first piece is "Ubi Caritas", which translates as 'Where Charity and Love is, God is there', and reflects Jesus' service to the disciples and humility in the washing of their feet. The second piece is "Stay With Me" which refers to when Jesus asked the disciples to stay awake and pray for him, but they could not. The third piece is "Jesus Remember Me" which refers to the words of one of the men crucified next to Jesus, who asked for forgiveness whilst on the cross.

Reading – A case study of service: Help for refugees and those suffering, including a poem by Ezra Jeremiah Maniquis read by Luca Chandler, Year 12, *Head Boy 2022-23*

Ezra's poem uses sunflowers and nightingales, Ukraine's national flower and animal, to represent the Ukrainians and their struggle as refugees or as fighters for their country. Sunflowers stay firm and survive in tough ground, while always facing the sun. Nightingales are also found in Ukraine in spring, singing beautiful songs. These symbolise the Ukrainians' optimism and resilience. It also symbolises the hope Easter promises after suffering beyond words for all around the world.
