ADJUDICATOR – Max Kenworthy

Director of Music - The Leys School, Cambridge



A native of Yorkshire, Max Kenworthy has been Director of Music at The Leys since September 2016 and, with the assistance of his excellent team, oversees all aspects of music in the school. Prior to this he was Assistant Director of Music and College Organist at Ardingly College in West Sussex for six years. He has performed recitals all over the world and has undertaken recordings, broadcasts and tours in organ, piano, singing and conducting.

Max began his musical career as a chorister under Christopher Dearnley and John Scott at St. Paul's Cathedral, London, and started learning the organ at Bradford Grammar School before a year as Organ Scholar at Rochester Cathedral. He then studied music at the University of Oxford where he was Organ Scholar at Brasenose College. Max is a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists.

He has held a number of church and cathedral positions, including Hampstead Parish Church, London; Wellington Cathedral of St. Paul in New Zealand where he was Assistant Director of Music for five years; and Organist and Director of Music at All Saints Church, Hove and St. Wilfrid's Church, Haywards Heath.

He has performed with a wide variety of ensembles and has dabbled in music journalism, broadcasting and jazz. He has given solo recitals at numerous venues including St. Paul's Cathedral and Westminster Cathedral in London, and when time permits, he also performs with Nicholas Grigsby as the organ duo 'Four Hands / Four Feet'. They have toured extensively and their last major collaboration took them to New York City and the Bermuda Festival. Max has recorded several CDs and has worked with numerous ensembles and choral groups in the UK. His organ teachers have included Roger Sayer, David Goode, Jeremy Filsell and Colin Walsh. Max is married to Laura and has two young children. In his spare time he flies planes and is an ardent follower of Yorkshire County Cricket Club and the All Blacks

Dom Walkley



I have always grown-up playing and listening to music. The Bishop's Stortford High School has always been great at allowing for musical opportunities. Here, I have played in many groups from year 7 to year 12 and all the music teachers I have learnt from have made me fall in love with music more than I ever thought I would. Playing the trumpet in Swing Band has always been a joy to me since I joined in year 7 and has really helped me develop as a musician and it has allowed me greater understanding of music as a whole. Currently, my passion for music has never been higher which is due to my teachers who have taught me to appreciate the music I listen to and develop my own playing ability. Overall, I believe I have really developed as a player since performing in many groups here, and also have much greater acknowledgment for music in general. I am very grateful to be here in the final against fantastic musicians which, to me, shows how far I have come as a musician.

Max Porter



I love the drive of the funk, rap, and classic rock genres – the punch and power of the guitar. I grew up in awe of Brian May, Slash, Pink Floyd, and Jimi Hendrix. Playing Floyd's 'The Wall' in my first live gig was the most exhilarating experience. Performing in bands, I have continued searching for that buzz playing Eagles country rock, Metallica metal, and even a musical of '80s disco and funk. I also play swing and jazz, especially artists like Sinatra and Bublé, which inspired me to pick up the bass guitar and learn the slap and pop behind the Chili Peppers and Chic.

Today, I will be performing a guitar track called Leadsheet. It was written for the Grade 8 exams in a fusion of rock, rap, and hip-hop, in the styles of Rage Against the Machine, Limp Bizkit, Run DMC, and Led Zeppelin. The actual track has one improvised solo, and I've also added one at the end

inspired by Guns N' Roses, AC/DC, and Van Halen's iconic tone and soloing techniques. The mix of tap technique, legato phrasing, and dynamic variation made this a really challenging one, so I hope you enjoy.

David Badcock



I was given a choice of instruments to learn at primary school, and having already tried a flute at a *FunHarmonics* orchestral concert, I opted for the flute. It was nearly a non-starter when I was told my hands were too small, however a bit of searching found a modified flute for little hands, and my lessons could start.

Subsequently, I moved on to a full sized instrument and I have been learning with Peter Foster for the last five years. I was very pleased to achieve my ABRSM *Grade 8* last year. I am now studying with Peter Shrubshall, and am looking forward to learning some more advanced repertoire.

I love playing a broad range of music, particularly jazz, and enjoyed participating in the Guildhall's *Jazz and Rock Week*. I enjoy playing in several

ensembles at school and in the Saffron Walden SCYM orchestra. Having found the flute was just too practical, I also took up the double bass, which continues to be far larger than necessary.

When not playing music, I can be found sailing, swimming, playing water polo, or supporting Arsenal.

Nicholas Miller



I started my musical journey at age 7, when my grandad brought me a violin. After learning for a couple years, I also picked up the viola, and began to play in local youth orchestras. These first few years were important in building a foundation for my future musical endeavours. The most important part of my journey began around 5 years ago when I first tried playing the piano. I fell in love with the instrument instantly, and I feel this passion combined with lots of practice has gotten me to where I am today. It hasn't been an easy process, as I am largely self-taught, but definitely worth all of the hard work!

Over the past couple years, I have been embracing the challenge of expanding my artistry by learning the guitar, bass and alto saxophone, as well as developing my song writing and music production skills. Currently, I

am the Student Head of Music at TBSHS, and despite not taking A-Level Music, I continue to play in a variety school bands on both the piano and violin and accompany the singing of hymns in school assemblies. My focus now is preparing for my grade 8 exams in piano and violin this year. The piece I am playing tonight is Étude Op. 25, No. 7 by F. Chopin. I was inspired by a previous TBSHS Musician of the Year to play this piece, and I feel that it captures a wide array of emotions and tells an interesting story. It is the perfect balance of being technically and musically challenging. Performing, listening to, and writing music plays a huge part in my life and I hope to continue learning in all aspects of music.

Henry Davis



I started playing the classical guitar at the age of six and rapidly built up a love for the instrument. However, it was not until joining this school in year 7 that I began working towards my grades. I am currently working towards my grade eight and hope to complete it by the time that I leave sixth form. I have been fortunate enough to perform the classical guitar both individually and as part of an ensemble on several occasions and have always relished the experience. I have also previously had the privilege of attending a masterclass with the world-renowned classical guitarist Gary Ryan where he talked me through the intricacies of one of his arrangements I was playing at the time and helped critique and improve my overall playing. This evening, I will be performing the Prelude composed by Vincent Lindsey-Clark. This is a Baroque piece originally played by performers as an

introduction used to warm their fingers up before playing succeeding movements that were usually longer and more complex. However, during the Romantic era, preludes were also played as stand-alone pieces of work.



Jonny Brewer



I started playing the drums at age six – to the dismay of my neighbours I'm still going twelve years later. My main influences include Roger Taylor (Queen), Cozy Powell (Rainbow), Taylor Hawkins (Foo Fighters) and John Bonham (Led Zeppelin) – so the piece I'm playing today (a Latin funk piece) is quite a big step out of my comfort zone stylistically.

In terms of what drew me to being a musician/performing initially, my parents are fairly musical (playing guitar, bass and piano between them), with my dad introducing me to Queen at a very young age and me being instantly enthralled. I think it's because of my love for Queen that I'm very conscious of the performance aspect in everything I do musically – if it's not entertaining then what's the point?

In addition to drums, I've also played piano since the age of seven (including some jazz piano for a few years), had lessons in tuned percussion, and am also self-taught on guitar and vocals (which is what I'm doing most of the time in my band).

This being my fourth (and last) Music Festival Finalé Concert, reflecting on the last few years at this school has made me realise just how many performance opportunities I've been fortunate enough to take advantage of, from being the drummer in Swing Band and Concert Band to playing in the school musical *Disco Inferno* – it's genuinely been a privilege to play with so many talented musicians in such a great environment and for that I am eternally grateful – I'll miss it a lot.

I have been singing since a young age, I love musical theatre and acting. I am currently working towards my Gold LAMDA musical theatre exam and have previously completed up to grade 6 in singing.
