- BE PROACTIVE
 - Knock on doors and pop into local businesses/shops/schools with your CV
 - School reputation and Mrs Jonas's name go a long way
 - Identify places via internet search and the school weekly career news
 - Attend in-school career workshops to network
 - Mrs Jonas does not have a bank of placements to allocate but can give quick pointers
 - Deadline for all completed paperwork to Mrs Jonas is 2 May

Why University?

- A sound investment:
 - Median starting salary for graduates: £36,000pa
 - Gain in average net lifetime earnings of around 20%
 - Graduate Premium £130,000 (male), £100,000 (female) on average over lifetime (after tax, student loan repayments – avg debt £45,000)
 - BUT <u>not all degrees equal</u> subject/university matter
 - On average, 1 in 5 would have been better off by not going to uni
- Covid Effects?
 - 12% drop in graduate recruitment by Top 100 Employers in 2020 but increased in 2021 of 9.4%
 - Set to increase intake by further 15.7% in 2022
 - All 15 key sectors looking to increase vacancies now 11% higher than pre-pandemic peak



Why University?

- Gain depth of understanding and develop critical and analytical skills in your chosen area
- Build independence
- Build a network
- An enjoyable experience

Vocational Qualifications, Gap Year, Work



Vocational Qualifications

- HNCs (Higher National Certificates) and HNDs (Higher National Diplomas) are work-related (vocational) higher education qualifications
- Designed to give you the skills to put knowledge to effective use in a particular job
- Provided by over 400 universities and further education colleges
- Check prospectuses of Hertfordshire and Cambridge Regional Colleges, Harlow College, Writtle College

<u>Gap Year</u>

- Well planned, structured and productive: could be a good option
- Employers will not look favourably on a poorly organised gap year with no focus or benefit to your development – do something meaningful
- Volunteer to help others and put your skills to the test, maybe discover a different culture and learn a new language
- Gain relevant experiences in the area you wish to study/work
 - e.g. Investment20/20 12 month traineeships
- Mature and clarify your thinking for the future



Straight into work?

- Positives:
 - Earn money and gain work-related skills
- Things to think about:
 - Is it going to challenge/develop you?
 - Are you gaining any further qualifications?
 - What prospects are there for you in the future will you still be doing the same job?
 - If competing for a job, will a more qualified or less qualified person be employed?



Apprenticeships



Apprenticeships

- Work for a company, gain job specific experience, skills and a wage
- Spend some time at a university/college completing various courses
- Major government policy
 - Apprenticeship Levy
- Usually funded by the company and government
- Excellent retention rates, progression and promotion
- No Student Debt "Learn as you Earn"
- Apprenticeship Premium £150K over lifetime




Types of Apprenticeships



* some of the latest Level 7 apprenticeship standards are aimed at Sixth Form school-leavers, rather than recent graduates

- Generally aim for Higher or Degree Level
 - Require a level 3 education qualification (A levels or BTEC)
- Starting salaries at least £18K
- Use Advanced as a stepping stone





Applications - Timelines

- Unlike university no centralised system, no set timelines
 - Major companies open in Autumn 2023
 - Others not until Spring or Summer Term 2024
- Need to be proactive -
 - Register for alerts at <u>www.gov.uk/apply-apprenticeship</u> and direct with companies
 - Find relevant work experience
 - Attend Insight/networking events
 - Research Unifrog tool, see Post-18 Booklet, Workbook, Notices, Bulletins



Selection Processes

Selection will include all or some of the following:

- Cover Letter/CV
- On-line Application Form competency based questions
- On-line tests verbal/non-verbal reasoning, numeric, situational, judgement
- Interview (face-to-face/telephone/video)
- Assessment Centre
- Final Interview

WANT TO GO TO UNIVERSITY?



Types of Degree HONOURS DEGREE

- usually last 3 or 4 years but could be longer e.g. Medicine, Architecture (BA, BSc)
- Additional year to make a Masters
- Further study for Doctorate (PhD)

HND or FOUNDATION DEGREE

 usually last two years but can often be converted into an Honours degree

SPECIALIST QUALIFICATIONS

 Beng (Engineering), Bed (education), LLB (Law), MB or BMB (Medicine)



<u>Choosing a degree</u>

- Will you enjoy it?
- Content?
- Structure?
- Assessment?
- Career plans?
 - NB: More than 50% of graduate jobs do not specify a particular degree
- Do you get the 'hands on' job-related experience? (Placement years/sandwich degrees/work experience)

Be careful: courses with same title may cover different things

Entry Requirements

- What grades do you need? Be realistic!
- What qualifications?
- Are certain combinations of qualifications recognised?
- Unifrog University tool as first port of call



Choosing an Institution

- What is the quality of teaching like?
- What facilities do they have?
- What type of University is it?
- What accommodation is available?
- What careers advice do they provide?
- Go and visit! (even if virtual)



Other Considerations



<u>Student Finance - is university too</u>

expensive?

- Tuition Loans Up to £9,250 pa tuition fees
- Maintenance Loans £4,524 minimum rising to £9,076 (out of London, away from home, household income under £25K)
- Loan Repayment 9% of amount above £25,000 reduced from £27,295 a year (£2,083 a month/£481 a week)
- If earning £30,000, monthly repayment is £37.50 (was £20)
- The monthly repayment is not linked to the size of the debt
- Written off after 40 years was 30 years
- Scholarships, bursaries and grants available



Role of Parent/Carers

- Be interested and open to their ideas
- Share your advice and experience (but is it up-to-date?)
- Support them with open days, work experience, taster events
- OPEN DAYS you can provide
 - Transport
 - Another perspective
 - Help with booking (well in advance!)
 - Summer Term we will authorise up to 4 days
 - Not allowed in Autumn Term unless exceptional circumstances



Role of the Personal Statement/CV

- Why have you chosen the subject/job sector?
- Why do you care about the subject/job sector?
- What have you read? What did you learn from what you read?
- What have you done? What did you learn / gain from the experience?
- What are the SKILLS that you have to make you an effective student in this subject?
- Record Activities and Skills in Unifrog

References and UCAS Predictions

- Tutors write references, citing the information provided by subject teachers
- Predictions are best possible <u>– based on Post-18 Gateway</u>
 <u>Examinations</u>
- School will also be asked to provide predicted grades for any job/apprenticeship



The first step does not commit you to a one way path

Work hard no matter which route you take

You cannot hide your results or predictions if you are going to university, applying for an apprenticeship or a job
